

It is a participatory sport in which everyone gets a medal - we can feel good about ourselves, and in these problematic times, that is definitely a good thing.


It is important because of our plundering of natural resources and because of global warming.

Unless the thing you are recycling is either made of paper, of which about 67% will be actually recycled, or aluminum, of which approximately 65% will be recycled.


Let's look at what is going on.

In 2018 Americans generated about 285 million tons of solid waste; 32% of that was either recycled or composted.



This graph shows the types of waste we generate.

Following is the proportion of solid waste that is recycled, by category:



Iron and steel are the best items for recycling; lithium ion batteries, shredded paper, plastic bags, hoses, wires, extension cords and needles are the worst items for recycling.

Almost everything else either goes into landfills or is distributed around the environment.

Sure, here are some images featuring people born in Scotland in 1820:



Alabama's Supreme Court has ruled that frozen embryos are people, the first time a court has ever given rights and protections so early after conception. A number of people - Catholics come to mind, but also Muslims and many other Christians - believe that life begins at conception. 
